## COOKIES II by Ucaoimhu

Happy birthday, Zebraboy! In this cryptic:

**I. Sondheim Review.** I've reused your "Cookies" set to stage a scene from a *sequel* to *Anyone Can Whistle*. In 11 clues, the wordplay yields a letter string with one letter replaced by (i) one or (ii) two letters. Write each (i) letter *right* or *left* (for an *Across* or *Down* clue) of the grid row the original letter is in; write each (ii) pair beside its *clue*, and circle the original letter in the grid. The pairs (in clue order) will describe the sequel; circled and (i) letters (by column) will say what nominee it made into a winner.

II. Labor Day. Four laborers each work on four Down answers before entry: (1) the nurse changes any instance of a certain letter to a certain other letter, (2) the early shift worker Caesar shifts all letters from the precentral one through the *pre*antepenultimate by a certain amount, (3) the sr. elevator operator raises (by a certain amount) any letter that's just above an S or R, and (4) the apiarist makes the (perhaps disjointed) state of the beehive OK. (Two altered entries will be capitalized.) In each II clue is a noncryptic clue to its altered entry; for each n 1–4 in order, read the letter pair *after* this clue in (*n*)'s *n*th clue, to get eight-letter laborer x. Alter Stephen Sondheim's x for ACW as per 1–4 in order to get his x for its sequel; one person (A) in our scene, yet another kind of laborer, is associated with the latter, and the rows in the grid's left section to the *right* of (i) letters will say how.

**III. Mystery Hunt.** 19 Across clues each have a wrong letter, to be corrected before solving, at the (a) start, (b) interior, or (c) end of a word; for each of (a), (b), and (c), all wrong letters and then all right letters (each in clue order) will clue (based on (a) **18th-century history**, (b) **Inception**, or (c) **kids' lit**) a three-letter answer (which **sleuths** may also find in the grid's *right* section to the *left* of a (i) letter). Answers (a), (b), (c) in order will name the scene's other person, **B** (who was also in *ACW*).

Finally, two ambiguous Down clues each have two answers differing at one square; the diagonal in the Dessert Plate through *both* squares, plus one through *neither*, plus **B**, will describe the scene's key event two ways (as per the answers chosen); the circles and (i) letters from **I** will give that event's result. The first and last letter in each of the remaining five Down clues (in clue order) will say what **B** did earlier in the scene (and name two key elements of things like the sequel). To finish, circle both diagonals so that the dessert (the one on a diagonal) will be inscribed properly for both you and *ACW*. Bon appetit!
