In Con Sequence by Ucaoimhu

This Conline after the Con in Montréal features a French guest author who could explain what leads to what. In this puzzle:

- (1) Six answers must have the same bigram added before entry. (Four resulting entries will be capitalized, abbreviated, and/or two words; also, each such clue contains a noncryptic clue for the entry.) The bigram goes in *diagonally*, so its *second* letter and all later letters in the entry overlap another entry, and in the original grid space all squares after its *first* letter are unchecked.
- (2) For each such unchecked square, if it is the *n*th square of the crossing entry, note the *n*th letter in that crossing entry's clue; in clue order, these will give the author *and* some text he wrote; the text will also tersely describe how to add the bigram. Then in the grid read the square that (going in the same diagonal direction) is after each bigram to see a translation of the text, and take the square after each of *those* squares to see another translation.
- (3) The clue for every crossing entry from (2) that is *not* one of the twelve entries mentioned in (1) has an extra word, which must be deleted before solving; in clue order, these will name (in English) the book in which (2)'s text appears.
- (4) In (3)'s book, (2)'s text precedes a four-letter word that could indicate a letter and a location. In twelve yet unused clues, that letter appears extraneously in that location in one word of the clue, or in the letter string the wordplay gives; if the extra letter is the *n*th-to-last in the word/string, note the *n*th-to-last letter in the clue. In clue order, these letters will form wordplay giving the four-letter word plus, again, that letter in that location.
- (5) For each of the remaining twelve clues, you'll reverse a four-letter (i) word before solving, or (ii) answer before entry; one (ii) entry is two words, and each (ii) entry is clued by a word in its clue. If the reversed/cluing word is the clue's *n*th word, note the clue's *n*th letter; in clue order, these letters will form an &lit clue for a four-letter word that reverses to a translation of (4)'s word.
- (6) Finally, (4)'s word precedes another phrase. For each of (1)'s six altered entries, for some p, q, and r, the bigram's first letter is in the original grid space's pth-to-last square, and the bigram's second letter and altered entry's last letter are in the overlapped entry's qth-to-last and rth-to-last squares, respectively. In clue order, the pth-to-last letters of the altered entries' clues will give the phrase, and the qth-to-last and rth-to-last letters of the overlapped entries' clues will give two meanings of that phrase: what it means in (3)'s book, and what the phrase itself could aptly say.
