Three Layers & One More

We are now in the midst of three symmetrically concentric puzzle events: BAPHL 22 (last Sunday and next Sunday), Zebraboy's Labor Day weekend extravaganza, and a Sunday puzzle picnic. Correspondingly, the grid has three concentric areas, and four answers starting in each area must be altered before entry:

Outer. Four answers starting in the dominating area must become definite leaders (in the appropriate tongue).

Middle. Four answers starting in the encased area must show how they're contained, capped, and wrapped around. (Containers come from an SF title, an SF trope, a poem, and a standard simile; caps come from YAK AT.)

Inner. Four answers starting in the width-two, area-four, esoteric area must have letters 2–4 translated from Latin.

(To help you out, the clue for each such answer contains a straight clue for the altered entry.)

The wordplay in each of the remaining clues yields a letter sequence with one incorrect letter; order the correct letters reverse-alphabetically by the incorrect letters to find three appropriate items, which can be altered in the ways above (respectively) to give the three appropriate terms seen in the sets of four circles in the respective grid areas.

Finally, each alteration involves a trio of letters next to one more letter; similarly, there is one more puzzle event that will take place in this time span, which appears in the grid twice (in rotationally symmetric places), each formed by two unchecked letters and a connected set of eight bars.
